Life has been peppered with trials, tragedies, sufferings, and struggles. The entire world is struggling and wrestling with the global pandemic. We read the statistics regarding the spread of "the virus." We scour the internet for the latest research about COVID-19 in hopes of moving closer to a cure. Generalized, free floating anxiety is ramped up as "the virus" exposes the vulnerabilities of nearly every society upon the face of the earth.
